The Trustees present their Annual Report and Accounts for the year ending the 30th September 2013.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITY

Fun in Action for Children recruits, assesses, trains and supports adult volunteers to befriend children from disadvantaged lone parent families living in the city of Brighton and Hove in East Sussex. Children are referred by teachers, social workers, mental health care professionals, parents and other voluntary agencies.

The charity works exclusively with lone parent families and to be accepted on the scheme children must be experiencing problems in at least two of four identified areas. These include difficulties in relationships with others, lack of confidence and self-esteem, problems in attendance and attitude to school and a need for opportunities to develop their interests and talents. The charity is oversubscribed with around 47% more children being referred every year than we are able to support. Last year 35 children were referred and we matched 18 children with volunteers.

Parental unemployment poor housing, social isolation and a lack of family or friendship support networks are common stressors for all families referred to the charity for help. Individual families also struggle with other problems including:

- 73% with a lone parent who has a disability and /or a chronic debilitating illness
- 45% with a lone parent who has ongoing mental health problems
- 36% who have experienced past domestic violence
- 23% with children who have a disability
- 18% with children who carry a significant caring role as a 'Young Carer' to a disabled lone parent

In families where there is no relief or support from everyday pressures these build up and the mental health and wellbeing of all families members suffers. The sole aim of our volunteers is to be of use to families in crisis, and so they are well placed to build non-judgmental and encouraging relationships which bring new energy and perspectives to family life. Often just the additional help provided by the befriender will be enough for the family to find a new momentum and move forward in a more positive way.

The charity is very aware of its responsibilities to provide safe and effective support to children and parents. All volunteers are rigorously assessed over a 5 stage process including an enhanced police check and taking up 3 full references. In addition all volunteers must attend 3 full days preparatory training, complete 2 in-depth interviews with charity staff and undergo a home safety check. Police background checks are repeated every two years. Through the thoroughness of the assessment process the charity seeks at all times to ensure the volunteers accepted on the scheme are trustworthy and demonstrate high levels of maturity so that their presence in the family adds benefit in a non-threatening and cooperative way. At times the children's behaviour can be challenging as they grapple with problems and test out the reliability and commitment of their befrienders. Many volunteers bring valuable skills and life experiences to the role which helps them get through these difficult times, and we also provide one to one caseworker support for each individual befriender and child for the length of the friendship. Most friendship last in excess of 2 years and some for life. The average length of our current 56 friendships is 3 years 2 months.

The charity forms respectful long term partnerships with families and "works with people to craft a common story of what went wrong and how things can be better" *. And although we cannot eliminate all the pressures bearing on children, the supportive close friendship each child

develops with their 'befriender' makes a huge positive difference to their lives, their parents' lives and often to the lives of the volunteer as well. Because befriending is long term, benefits that do accrue tend to become part of the fabric of each child's life and are sustained into adulthood. Befrienders also bring the benefits of education and employment to the consciousness of the child, encouraging them to aim high and fulfil their potential.

REVIEW OF PROGRESS AND ACHIEVEMENTS

This was the fourteenth year of operation for Fun in Action for Children. The Trustees are grateful to all whose support enabled the charity to continue providing our much needed service. The Trustees would particularly like to thank the organisation's committed staff who continue to deliver a service of quality and compassion in a challenging climate. We also acknowledge the importance of our volunteers who are very much the heartbeat of Fun in Action. We would particularly like to thank them for their dedication and enthusiasm.

The charity had 3 part time employees each working a three day contract. These include a Project Manager and two Senior Caseworkers who together managed and supported 65 adult/child friendships during the year. Of these 9 friendships came to an end (with an average length of 2.8 years) and 18 new friendships were made leaving the charity with 56 adult/ child friendship in place at the year end. Unfortunately 2 of our fully assessed volunteers had to pull out just prior to being matched with a child because of family illness and bereavement. This left us slightly short of our target for the year of 18 new friendships. We are hopeful these volunteers will return to us at some time in the future.

With 56 ongoing friendships we provide an average of 224 hours of one-to-one attention to needy children each weekend. We were also supporting 49 "Lifelong Friends" (ongoing open ended relationships between volunteers and children which we encourage and support when the more formal befriending has ended).

An additional and vital element of our work is bringing people together to celebrate community and break down some of the crushing isolation experienced by lone parents and their children. In the year to September 2013 we organized and ran 3 very popular and well attended group outings with an overall attendance of 265 people.

All staff are qualified professionally and skilled and experienced at placing safe and effective volunteers in vulnerable families. Their success is evidenced by the many positive outcomes outlined in the table below. The feedback shown below was taken from reports completed entirely independently by befriended children and their parents.

The charity continued to develop its website in the year, providing information and easy access to all our services. The Trustees are grateful for the efforts of our volunteer website manager who manages our on line profile at www.funinaction.org.uk.

THE OBJECTIVES FOR THE COMING YEAR

The Trustees are pleased to report the charity was able to retain all three staff throughout the year. The Trustees are grateful to the staff for their work in what is a very challenging climate. A key objective for 2014 and the long term, is to raise the additional funds needed to consolidate and expand the work of the charity in order to fully meet the heavy demand for the service.

Trustees are continuing their attempts to diversify the charity's fundraising strategy. Exploring the possibility of opening up a charity shop in Brighton remains a high priority. Trustees are making good progress in taking this forward and are actively seeking funding to underpin a first year of operation.

The staff and Trustees spent time in the year exploring a possible name and logo change for the charity. Parents and children did not overall support a name change and so this has been dropped. A change of logo was agreed and this will be implemented shortly.

ORGANISATION

The Trustees reviewed the ongoing finances of the charity through access to regular updated budgets, management accounts and other information provided by staff at a total of 6 Trustee meetings held during the year. As a general rule the Trustees aim to retain around 3 months running costs in the general reserves account at any one time to minimise the uncertainties arising from fluctuations in fundraising.

The Trustees also used meetings to review the progress of the charities work with children and families through the sharing of detailed reports (both written and verbal) provided by the Project Manager and casework staff.

The Annual General Meeting was held on the 10th April 2013 when the Financial Year Ending Accounts to the 30th September 2012 were presented and reviewed by the charities accountant, Paul Stammer. A detailed summary and statistical report for casework completed in the year was then presented by the Project Manager and reviewed by Trustees.

Fun in Action for Children is a registered charity and is constituted as a company, limited by guarantee. It was incorporated in September 1999 under the companies Act 1985. Its objects and powers are as set out in its Memorandum and Articles of Association. It is governed by a board of Trustees. New Trustees can join the board with the agreement of a majority of existing board members. Recruitment of new members is ongoing to ensure that the breadth of experience needed in the charity is met.

TRUSTEES

The board of Directors acts as Trustees for the charitable company. The Directors of the Charitable Company during the year were as follows:

The charity is fortunate in having Trustees on the Board who have each been with the charity for more than 6 years. These include the parent of two children who have benefitted from the scheme.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Fundraising generated £78,010 in grants and donations during the year. The year ended with a deficit of £262 unrestricted funds. Management and administration expenditure was kept to a minimum, with funds raised going in the main on direct charitable activities. The accumulated surplus of £24,413 is to be used primarily to ensure that the children involved in this scheme are assured continuity in their friendships with their befrienders.

STATUTORY REQUIREMENTS

The Trustees confirm that the financial statements following this report comply with the current statutory requirements and with the requirements of the charity governing document.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS for the year ended 30 September 2013

1. Accounting policies

Accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities and all other applicable accounting standards as modified by the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England and Wales . The company has taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No. 1 from the requirements to produce a cash flow statement.

Incoming resources

Incoming resources represents the value of grants, donations and other income received during the period by the company, accounted for on a receivable basis. The details of the major grants received during the year are set out in note 9.

In the opinion of the directors / trustees, none of the income of the company is attributable to geographical markets outside the UK (the corresponding figure for 2012 was nil).

Deferred income

Grants received in advance and specified by the donor as relating to specific accounting periods or alternatively which are subject to conditions which are still to be met are deferred on an accruals basis to the period to which they relate. Such deferrals are shown in the notes to the accounts and the sums involved are shown as creditors in the accounts.

Recognition of liabilities

Liabilities are recognised on the accruals basis in accordance with normal accounting principles, modified where necessary in accordance with the guidance given in Statements of Recommended Practice for accounting and reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England and Wales.

Depreciation

Fixed assets have been capitalised and are being written off on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful economic life of 3 years.

Funds structure policy

The accounts distinguish between restricted and unrestricted funds. Restricted funds are received from donors subject to restrictions on the purposes for which they may be used. Unrestricted funds are subject to no such restrictions and may be used by the charity for expenditure on its objects or appropriation to reserves for internally designated purposes.
